Very soon after, I met with a staff lawyer who I will never forget for the rest of my life. She referred me to a great counsellor at the Clinic who helped me bring back my being that was shattered and scattered.

Though years have gone by, it feels like only yesterday. I am extremely grateful to have my life back and it is all because of you.

When I was hungry, the Clinic gave me food vouchers to feed myself and my daughter, and transit tokens to help me get home. During the holiday season, I received gifts for my little girl; this really made a difference.

But the most important thing — I was given custody of my daughter and I regained my freedom and safety.

I thank all of you who have touched my life and helped me to get it back.

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

Canadian women have experienced at least one incident of physical or sexual violence since the age of 16.

It is simply unacceptable that one in three women globally will experience violence in her lifetime and that approximately every six days a woman in Canada is killed by her intimate partner.

The Barbra Schlifer Commemorative Clinic helps women build lives free from violence. In 2015, the Clinic provided more than 3,800 women with the vital resources they needed to rebuild their lives.

women received the support of a professional Schlifer Clinic counsellor, helping them to

heal from the impacts of violence;

1,330 women received access to their legal rights through a Schlifer Clinic lawyer; and

1,317 women were provided with a Schlifer Clinic-trained language interpreter, so that they could ensure their experiences were properly understood.

On average, 15 WOMEN ADY sought out our services, called us for information, and made an appointment to speak with a lawyer, counsellor or translator. Many sought safety with us until their personal crisis was resolved. It is here, at the Clinic, that women seek and find support and solutions for the violence that threatens them and their children.


Consistent with our mandate, we unwaveringly served the underserved, and represented the unrepresented. Your help made this possible. We are specialists in the complex intersections of law and life that a woman facing violence of any form is forced to navigate. We provide skilled counselling, access to stable housing and group support when her past crupts into her present life through memory and trauma. We step up when international treaties fail to protect her, whether in civil war, migration or settlement in Canada, or when a husband or partner is not prosecuted. We help women tell the truth about the brutal facts of the many forms of violence that cause women's emigration and immigration, and that are still not fully recognized by our immigration system.

The Clinic's multi-faceted services and programs described above account for only a fraction of the resources needed to help women rebuild their lives. Funds raised must also cover the cost of the communication services that first allow her to locate us; administrative staff to answer the phones and serve as the Clinic's interface with clients; and, intake staff who will carefully guide a client's transfer. experience to ensure she receives the most appropriate service. Funds are also needed to provide access to our Parent Relief program so that a mother can focus on her next step toward freedom, knowing that her child or children's needs are being met. Only once these primary services are realized, can a woman access the free legal, counselling and interpretation services and education programs available to her.

In order to provide the myriad services and programs we offer, we continued to adhere to a strict code of efficiency and maximize the funds we raised by keeping our costs low. There is, unfortunately, always more demand for our services.

Thanks to an unexpected bequest, this year we were able to put a small surplus away for a rainy day. This will not always be the case.

As you read this year's annual report, we hope that you will be moved to ask us crucial questions, and motivated to join us in our commitment to prevent, and end violence against women and girls in all its forms.
